#### **Gayton Church Heritage Trust**

The Church will have undergone its five yearly inspection and report on the state of the building by the time this edition of the Gayton News is delivered. We will know then how much there is to do in the way of repairs and possibly some ideas from the Architect of improvements that might be undertaken to maximise the use of the building.

In July John Shaw organised the twelfth and sadly the last of the very successful, 'Jazz in the Church', evenings. These concerts have been immensely popular and have raised between £13,000 & £14,000, which is incredible. GCHT is deeply indebted to him and to Lois for all their hard work and skill in attracting top jazz musicians to Gayton. The money raised has helped hugely towards paying for the facilities we now enjoy in the church. It also demonstrated to the Grant giving bodies that the Trust was credible and capable of raising our own funds and worthy of support in our efforts to maintain and enhance the church building.

Thanks to being prompted by Viv Watterson to apply, GCHT have been fortunate in getting a small grant from South Northants New Homes Bonus Scheme of £4,000 to pay for some draft proofing measures in the church tower, ringing chamber and other essential repairs, which hopefully can be completed before the winter.



In December the Northants Touring Arts will be coming to Gayton with the New Perspectives Theatre Company who will be performing a Christmas who done it 'He wore a Red Hat'. They are booked for Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> December in the afternoon. Please do contact me for tickets and

further information. These shows are subsidised through the South Northants Arts funding budget and I would love to put on more as they really are very good and affordable and a way of raising money from a wider audience than from relying always on the village. I have just looked on the Touring Arts website to see what is on. Piva who came to Gayton last year are performing 'Music from Shakespeare's time' at various venues in the Autumn and another amazing sounding 'Gypsy Group', who play and talk about Balkan Music and poetry, but sadly we don't have an opportunity this year to fit them in as our calendar of events is full. However I am looking to replace ' Jazz in the Church' with other concerts for next year with the aim of continuing the level of fundraising that John has been so successful in doing until now. # From the Priest-in-Charge

Rites of passage have figured prominently in the benefice over the last few weeks. During July and August we had more funerals than we've had for the rest of the year put together but, at the opposite end of life's span we've had two baptisms and are due two more (one of three children); and in between we have three more weddings to look forward to before the end of the year.

Rites of passage encompass the whole spectrum of emotions from complete sadness and feeling of bereftness to memories of joy and laughter as we recount incidents, many long forgotten, that we shared with our now departed loved ones. In baptism we share the excitement and joy of, mostly, new parents and we remember baptisms of siblings; we choose carefully (most of the time!) those we particularly want to share in the child's upbringing and development as we decide on godparents and we start the nurturing process of those older people who come to us for baptism. Wedding couples can be



excited, nervous, almost overwhelmed to begin with but it is such a joy to work with them in the months leading up to their big day (and for me, it is an even bigger joy when, later, they ask me if I can baptise their children!). Yes, rites of passage cross all generations. They can be exhausting both physically and mentally but they are definitely a major part of the church's witness in our communities.

And what a role model we have – Jesus. In the gospels we encounter Jesus in rites of passage - mourning the death of his friend, raising a child back to life, encouraging the children to be brought to him for blessing, attending a wedding (and preaching a parable about another one). Jesus, our fully human and fully divine Saviour, knew and knows all about rites of passage and all the emotions surrounding them.

Rites of passage are a natural part of our existence as are the seasons, which in some ways emulate our experiences. In spring we think about new life from seeds etc and at this time of year we think about the completion of the cycle – harvest. Each of our four churches will be celebrating harvest in some way – check the service rota and what's on. Our schools also will be celebrating harvest either in church or at school – check with the schools for dates and times.

God is SO good; he gives us so much more than we desire, need or actually want; he supports us through each and every stage of our life. Isn't it right that we give him thanks and praise through our rites of passage services and at harvest time?



#### **Canal Boats and River Craft Gather at Northampton Festival of Water**

Historic canal boats, narrow boats and river craft all gathered in the sunshine of Northampton and the bank of the river Nene was packed for a celebrity opening of the IWA Festival of Water over the Bank Holiday weekend in Becket's Park.

Celebrated actors and waterway ambassadors Timothy West and Prunella Scales opened the show, seen here in the picture, and enjoyed a special river cruise from Northampton Lock

upriver to explore the Westbridge Arm with a host of waterways enthusiasts and volunteers.

The party atmosphere was maintained throughout the weekend with highlights including youngsters trying their skills at bricklaying and digger driving with Waterway Recovery Group volunteers, demonstrations of boat handling skills in a huge variety of craft on the water by the Northampton Sea Cadets and a series of excellent and informative talks from renowned waterway personalities such as Tim Coghlan, David Blagrove and Liz Payne. The marquee in the park was packed to the seams all weekend as visitors to the show enjoyed local ales and fabulous musical entertainment.

IWA and WRG volunteers ensured everything ran smoothly and festival supporters, Northampton Borough Council, The Environment Agency and Canal & River Trust, as well as commercial sponsors, contributed to the organisation of the Festival and helped make the weekend a great success.

During the Festival Councillor Penny Flavell, Mayor of Northampton, handed over a ceremonial Tiller Pin to her counterpart Councillor Angela Underhill, Mayor of Walsall, on board the Crusader Community Boat which was offering public boat trips on the Nene. The Tiller Pin is the trophy awarded to the next town or city hosting the IWA's annual water based Festival. The Festival is set to be held in Pelsall on the Wyrley and Essington Canal, near Walsall, in 2016 over the August Bank Holiday weekend.

Celebrating the 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the opening of the Northampton Arm in 1815, which linked the Grand Union Canal to Northampton and the Nene, IWA's Festival of Water 2015 showcased Northampton's waterside at its very best.

The event received excellent coverage from BBC Radio Northampton and BBC Three Counties (Beds, Herts & Bucks) Radio, ITV and the local press.

These musicians provided some inventive and exciting solo and ensemble work, enjoyed by all, some of whom said it was "the best yet".

Looking back, and hopefully without being too immodest, I believe we can claim success as the two original objectives were achieved; we raised £13880 for the church and hosted some excellent bands, including some of the finest jazzmen in the country.

We thank all those who contributed through their dedication and hard work and all those who attended the concerts.
