Gayton Alms Charities

Gayton Alms Charities have been established for over 100 years. Today they are called the 'Gayton Relief in Need Charity' and the 'Gayton Educational Foundation'.

Gayton Relief in Need Charity

This charity exists to provide assistance to any person living in the Parish of Gayton* who for whatever reason find themselves in need, hardship or distress. Usually this assistance is financial, with money paid directly to the successful applicant. Examples of where this charity might be able to help are with the purchase of food, clothing, heating costs, and grants to assist with funeral expenses.

Gayton Educational Foundation

This charity exists to provide assistance to people under the age of 25 years living in the Parish of Gayton* who for whatever reason find themselves in need of financial help with their education. Money may be paid directly to the successful applicant but the trustees are able to grant money to organisations in the Parish of Gayton whose purpose is to educate or improve the lives of people under the age of 25 through leisure-time activities.

Examples of where this charity might be able to help are in the provision of books, equipment, computer software, IT hardware, musical instruments, travelling expenses, music or dance tuition, residential educational experiences, university fees or anything else not normally provided or funded by an educational institution such as a school or college.

The charities receive their modest income from land rent and returns on investments. Trustees meet twice a year to review income and expenditure, and to consider application for assistance under the terms of the scheme for administering the charities.

Any villager who feels they might be eligible for help under the terms of either of the Gayton Alms Charites should contact the secretary Barry Steer (tel: 01604 85886) who will provide the appropriate application form. The Chair of Trustees is happy to offer general advice about an application and/or assist with the completion of an application form.

*In exceptional cases the Trustees may give assistance to people living just outside the Parish of Gayton. These people must be able to satisfy the trustees that they ought to be treated as if they lived in the Parish.

Another Cracking Gala Concert

Those lucky enough to get hold of tickets for the Gala Concert in Gayton church on Friday 18th September certainly experienced something very special. Sparkling wine and canapés served on arrival, an audience dressed in their finest evening attire, a 'night club' atmosphere, all set the scene for what

was to become a magical evening of music and song by the charming and extremely talented Helen Swift, Jonathan French and Stephen Morris. Helen opened the concert in classical style with Mozart's *Schon lacht der holde Frühling* then joined husband Jonathan on piano to play two duets from Grieg's *Peer Gynt Suite – The Hall of the Mountain King* was spectacular! Next came three pieces by English composers. The first two, by John Ireland, were presented by Stephen playing the lovely *Fantasy Sonata for clarinet*, and Helen singing *I have twelve oxen*. Helen then sang the endearing *Linden Lee* by Ralph Vaughan-Williams. Jonathan wowed the audience with an unbelievably fast rendition of *Flight of the bumble bee* by Rimsky-Korsakov before all three artistes joined together to present The Spider by Flanders and Swann. An amusing end to an excellent first half.



The interval gave the audience time to refresh themselves at the bar and chat with friends and neighbours they hadn't seen for a long time or at least didn't recognise in their finery!



The second half began with Helen, Jonathan and Stephen performing a selection from *Carnival of the animals* by Camille Saint-Saëns. Stephen played the part of the elephant starting with his 'standard' clarinet. He soon decided that this instrument wasn't up to the job so brought on stage a much larger bass clarinet. After a few more bars the music stopped again, this time Stephen disappeared before returning to everyone's amusement with a huge contrabass clarinet – one of only a

handful in the UK. This time the elephant was truly represented! The lighter mood of the second half continued with our talented trio presenting glorious pieces from George Gershwin (*Walking the dog*), Herman (*Clarinet on the town*), Yourmans

(*Tea for two*) and Cole Porter (*The Oyster and Let's do it*). In the latter piece, yours truly was invited on stage to lead some audience participation! This involved some pretty nifty juggling of picture cards in time with the song so that the audience knew what to sing and when to sing it. A fun time was had by all and I did manage to leave the stage with my dignity intact! Only two songs remained on the programme, *High*



Hopes by Housen and Cahn, and Content to be behind me by Ben Moore. Helen sang, Jonathan and Stephen played, and the audience were captivated by wonderful music.

Then it was all over. The audience showed their obvious approval and admiration in the time-honoured way. Applause rang out in our lovely village church as our performers were presented with gifts to show our appreciation. As the applause continued, the inevitable encore came. The trio appropriately chose *Trio Finale* by Camille Saint-Saëns to bid us farewell

Reverend Marion Reynolds

I looked back over what I wrote the first December I was here (was it really four years ago?) when I talked about my love of algebra – solving the unknowns (X). We have moved on in the Benefice since then and, I believe, we are doing more to try to make X, the good news of the Gospel of Jesus (not just Christmas), known in our community. However, we must never become complacent – there is always so much more work we can and should do.

As I write this on a dark and murky afternoon, rain pouring and wind gusting, if I listen to the news on the TV or radio, I might be forgiven for asking myself: why on earth am I sending Christmas cards with peace on earth and goodwill to all written on them? What peace? What goodwill? What joy? What is there to celebrate? It all seems so dark and murky doesn't it? It was precisely the same over 2000 years ago in what we now call Israel – the people didn't think they had anything to celebrate – after all they were living under the harsh rule of their Roman conquerors weren't they? Where was God in their situation? And how often do we hear that same sentiment today, especially after the horror we all witnessed in Paris last weekend? I give the same answer as I gave when I was asked a similar question after 911: God is there with you, crying with you, sharing the pain, angry and frustrated. Why? Because it is not God who is perpetrating the evil we see and hear about all around us; it is man. As a Christian, John 3:16 is my lynchpin: "God so loved the world that he sent his only Son". That is the X, what Christmas is really all about.

At the end of November the church begins its new year, as always, with the season of Advent. Advent is one of two penitential seasons in the church (the other being Lent) when Christians particularly think about how far we fall short of what God would like us to be and we ask for His forgiveness. We look forward to celebrating Christ's first coming as a baby (at Christmas) and we also look forward to his promised second coming at some time which only God knows when every tear shall be wiped from our eyes and death shall be no more as we are told in Revelation 21. At the end of Advent we have one of the two joyful seasons of the church – Christmas (just as we have Easter at the end of Lent). Christmas is the time when Christians remember, and thank God, that He loved the world so much that He was prepared to send his only son to show us a role-model for life. Christmas Day is the time when we give thanks for the birth of the divine Jesus as a human being, to a human family.

We will be celebrating Advent, Christmas Night and Christmas Day. Everyone is welcome to come and join us for any, or all, of the services. Who knows, if you do, then maybe the X (that unknown) in Xmas will stop being an unknown, and you, too, will know the love of God in your life this Christmas.

May God bless you and all and those you love at this special time of year.

Here you can see the terrible condition of the base of the sign which secures it over the wooden post, it is rotten and rusted.

The lettering and numbers on the metal surround are not painted on, they are transfers and are peeling away.

Fungi in St Marys Court, Gayton

In October a cry for 'help' came across the internet from Barry & Wendy Steer.

"We have an amazing crop of fungi on our back lawn which has suddenly appeared over the last few days. In all the 41 years we've lived here, we've never seen anything like this.

Only this one corner of the lawn is affected. On all the rest there is just the odd fairy ring that we get every year.

What has caused this sudden and unprecedented infestation? How can we get rid of them? Can any of you knowledgeable gardening enthusiasts help us? If they were edible, it wouldn't be so bad, but we suspect they are not!

This was food for thought for Manja, so to speak! She immediately thought of Flemming Rune, a friend living in Denmark who she has known for many years. He is the author of many scientific books and beautiful books on fungi and forests. Manja also thought of her father who was an honorary member of the Danish Mycological Society. Flemming kindly identified Barry & Wendy's fungi as an Armillaria ('Honey Fungus'). It is most likely Armillaria lutea ('Bulbous Honey Fungus') with a club-shaped stem and lots of whitish veil remnants along the edge of the cap on the underside (partly covering the gills).

The fungus is not poisonous, but not really edible either. Some people consider it edible, but it has a rather insignificant taste, and a number of people get allergic reactions with it. I don't eat it myself!

Flemming's advice to Barry & Wendy was to 'do nothing, just sit back and enhoy nature's magic! Barry comment was he wasn't sure Wendy agreed with that!

The customary cheque from her arrived the following week for £135.81. The final sum donated over eleven year's amounts to a grand total of £3,943.34. I am most impressed and on behalf of the Trustees I would like to thank Alison and Steven for their hard work and generosity. We have appreciated their support over the years and as Gayton Companion Dog Show became a village institution so its popularity grew. Jazz in the Church and the Dog Show brought a lot of enjoyment to many people and were the events that we looked forward to each year - both will be sadly missed.
