



Although Marion joined us on very much a part-time working basis, in reality this turned out to be far from the truth. The energy, commitment and time she put into her duties in the benefice are second to none, she has done us all a fantastic job, we have been very privileged and are very grateful. I am sure you will all agree she will be a tough act to follow, we all wish them both all the very best for their move. Please come along to either the 11.00 service in Gayton on June the 18th, her last one in Gayton, to wish her a fond farewell or the 11.00 service in Cold Higham on the 25th for her finale in the Amelcote Benefice. On the bright side, at least when she and Paul have gone, we others may stand a better chance in the village quizzes!

Following Marion's move in June, the joint benefice shall face the unenviable task of trying to lure and secure a successor, as one would expect there are a series of protocols to follow and the selection is made by representatives of all the parishes, the church Patron and representation from the Bishop. We are told that the Bishop aims to fill such a post within 6 months however we need to face the realities of the task, it may take longer than anticipated. In the interim we shall strive to maintain a full schedule of regular services through the assistance of local clergy and Lay Readers. Gayton Village Hall Management Committee

May 2017 Chairman's Report

Another uneventful year has passed. The village hall continues to attract use from established groups (e.g. Evergreens and Table Tennis), local users (e.g. children's parties) and national users (e.g. ASPADS – working dogs user group). Although our village hall is not pretty it is functional and a cost-effective community building (cheap to hire). Many enquiries from outside of the parish cannot believe that our charges are for a hire period of up to 4 hours and not just per hour. However over the decades the use of the village hall has declined and currently our running costs threaten to exceed our income. The first 'main user' to leave us was Gayton School when they built their extension more than 10 years ago, but they still prefer to hire the village hall for annual fetes as its location, next to the village green, is convenient. Then the Table Tennis clubs declined from 6 or 7 teams playing out of Gayton to the current 4. With the advent of popular soft play areas and mobile mums the Gayton Toddler group was disbanded around 2008/2009. And now the village hall has competition from the Church as a venue for functions.

The current management committee, although numbering only 4 individuals, maintains a tight control of finances and the village hall should remain viable for at least another 5 years or more. It is probably of no surprise that all the management committee members have been in post for at least 10 years and some for 20 years and more! So once again I make a plea, if you value your community building and have a spare few hours a year please consider joining the village hall management committee. We try and meet 4 times a year to plan and execute the running of the village hall.

Campion School update

As our Sixth Formers near the end of their studies, thoughts are turning very much to their future careers. Two of our Sixth Form students have secured prestigious work experience placements with the United Nations in Geneva, one student has organised a Short Term Traineeship at the CERN Research Centre in Geneva for the summer holidays,



and two more had the opportunity of three days of work shadowing at the Houses of Parliament in April.

Students remain busy in school too. Congratulations to our Year 8/9 hockey team who won the district hockey tournament, beating Moulton School 9-0. They will be representing South Northants and Daventry at the County finals in July and we all wish them much success. The Year 7/8 cricket team also enjoyed victory in their first game of the season, comprehensively beat Quinton House by nine wickets. Students have also competed in the Track and Field Schools Cup, involving schools from across the county. Junior boys, inter boys and inter girls teams came second. Junior girls came third and we had winners for the girls in junior 100m, and inter 800m. Students participated in all events from 100m to 1500m, and all field events demonstrating superb commitment. Students from Campion participated in an inclusive PE event held at the Parker E-Act Academy. Students from mainstream and special schools participated in an archery tournament sponsored by the South Northamptonshire and Daventry School Sports Partnership. Of the nine teams taking part the Campion A and B team came both first and second! The B team will now progress to the County finals in June.

Our Duke of Edinburgh Award group recently completed their expedition, camping and trekking through the fields in Silverstone and beyond, with an overnight stay in the tents which they had carried themselves; the strength our students displayed - both physical and emotional – during the expedition ensured a successful outcome for all involved. Well done!

As a school, we also value the positive contribution made by many Campion students in community events. A good number of our students recently took part in the Gang Show, supported by their friends and fellow students in the audience. Congratulations to all for their involvement and support too!

Our Year 11 and post-16 students have worked hard in preparation for their external exams and I know you will join me in wishing them all the very best.

From the Rector

Are you old enough to remember that song which closed every episode of the late Peter Cook and Dudley Moore show "Not only but also"?

Now is the time to say Goodbye
Now is the time to yield a sigh (yield it, yield it)
Now is the time to wend our waaaayeeeeee
Until we meet again some sunny day.
Goodbye, goodbye, we're leaving now, Tattybye
Goodbye, we wish you all goodbye Fartatata, fartatata.

That is so appropriate to Paul and I as we start packing in preparation for our move to Staffordshire. I always thought there was a touch of poignancy in the song and that is certainly the case with us. We leave with very mixed feelings.

God does move in mysterious ways, ways so obvious with hindsight. We do so firmly believe He is in charge, His timescales are very rarely ours and His plans for us so often leave us initially wondering "what on earth is going on?" 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Maintaining Gayton Churchyard

Many readers will have noticed some significant changes in the churchyard of St. Mary's church. Regular mowing and grass cutting has been taken over by Allseasons Landscaping and Grounds Maintenance Contractors as part of their contract to cut our roadside verges and playing field. Our sincere thanks must go to Gayton Parish Council for providing this invaluable support to our village church.

Sunken graves are gradually being top filled with soil to create level surfaces. Over the next few months these patches will be composted, fertilized and reseeded. In addition, we intend straightening some of the tilted headstones to make things look a bit neater. The PCC would like to thank those volunteers who give up their time in assisting us with this work.

It would help us enormously if those people whose relatives or friends are buried in the churchyard would keep floral tributes as close as possible to the headstone marking each grave. This will enable mowing between headstones much easier, quicker and therefore less expensive.

As a PCC, we are governed by The Peterborough Diocesan Churchyard Regulations which state the following:

Containers with flowers should be placed as close to headstones as possible so that they do not obstruct mowing or churchyard maintenance.

Wreaths and other cut flowers may be placed on graves but removed as soon as they have withered.

There should be no artificial flowers except Remembrance Day poppies and traditional Christmas wreaths. These are to be removed after a period of two months.

Flower bulbs may be planted in the soil of any grave.

No tree, rose bush, or any other bush or shrub may be planted without the Chancellor's* permission.

We are sure you will agree that our churchyard has not looked so neat and tidy for a long time. The churchyard is a valuable heritage and an asset to our village and we hope that with everyone's support we can continue to improve its appearance.

Background to the formation of a Church Trust for Gayton Parish Church

The Gayton Parish Plan conducted by the Parish Council in 2001 identified future needs of the village by a questionnaire delivered to each household. Volunteers formed action groups run by the then Chair of the Parish Council to look at the areas receiving the greatest interest and what actions might be taken to address these issues.

The church received many responses highlighting its historic significance as well as the spiritual and social importance of the building as part of village life. Maintenance costs of the church were a major concern and it was becoming increasingly difficult for the Parochial Church Council to have sole responsibility for its upkeep. The Parochial Church Council agreed that with better facilities, the church could be used for concerts as a means of raising money. From the Parish Plan initiative a steering group was formed known as the Facilities Group with the purpose of fund raising for a servery and a toilet in the church. However, the state of the building needed urgent attention, requiring large sums of money. To apply for grant funding to help with maintenance costs it was necessary to become a fully constituted trust, with a well-defined remit for the overall benefit of the building and the community as the whole. The Application to the Charity Commission for Charitable Status was successful. The Facilities Group continued to raise money specifically for a servery and toilet in the Church and became founder members of Gayton Church Heritage Trust. Our charitable status had credibility because it had the backing of the 2001 Gayton Parish Plan and formed the basis of all applications for community grant funding. This is of particular relevance as at the present time because the process of looking at the needs of the village and how to fund projects currently being looked at.

Gayton Gardeners and Allotment Society

Allotment News

The soil is warming, there's plenty of rain and everything is beginning to grow more quickly - especially the weeds! This time of year is particularly busy for vegetable gardeners, much of the sewing and planting done now will produce crops over the summer and autumn and looking around the allotment, I see beans of all shapes and sizes, sweetcorn, peas, brassicas, potatoes, courgettes and winter squashes to name but a few. The fruit is beginning to swell too. First come the strawberries that have so much more flavour than supermarket varieties - we're eating ours now (so are the pigeons)!

Looking forward there are a few things planned for the summer. The allotments will be open to visitors on the Gayton Open Gardens day on July 2nd and, once again, there will be a member of the allotment society on hand to show people around and answer questions for any visitors uninitiated in the art of vegetable gardening. Who knows, a bit of recruiting might go on too! We also have our members BBQ in July, an annual event that has become a bit of a tradition over the years. As always we will keep our fingers crossed for good weather and ensure that we don't clash with Silverstone (like we did last year). The fantastic puds and excellent chefs are of course a given. It's also possible that alcohol will be involved.

The resurfacing of our drive is at last complete and we are now turning our attention to buying and building our 'swap shop' and completing the community garden, by which time we will have used up the last of the grant we got from South Northants Council. We may well look at other fund raising ideas next year, the aim being to continue improving facilities for our members.

We have a few vacant plots at the moment in a variety of sizes. The smallest could be dug in an hour or two and would be ideal for someone with limited time or a beginner who wants to try vegetable growing to see if they like it. The largest is not for the faint hearted and needs to go to someone who is willing and able to put in some seriously hard work (or own a tractor!). So if you think you might like to join our group of green fingered enthusiasts and grow your very own fresh vegetables, get lots of fresh air and swap a few tales about the size of your marrow, contact me at the e-mail address at the end of the article.

Curiosity Corner

It's about time for me to ramble on a bit about a couple of new things I am thinking of doing this season. The first is to dig less. This cannot be bad as it means less work but in order to get started I will need lots of mulch to suppress the weeds and improve the soil structure. I have it on good authority that by hoeing or mowing my plot and then covering it with mulch, I can plant most things directly into the resulting covering layer of water retaining, weed suppressing soil improver without digging. The main drawback is the need for lots of mulch to start with which may mean buying bulk bags of mushroom compost. However, once the weeds are controlled, old straw, grass cuttings or home made compost should suffice and hopefully they'll be free. Small weeds may appear but they can be easily controlled by hoeing (really!)

I don't pretend to have thought this up myself, we have at least one member who already practices minimum dig gardening and as always I will copy anything that works. If you are interested in learning more, there is a very informative book called 'Organic Gardening, the natural no dig way' written by Charles Dowding.

The second thing I want to try is growing dwarf fruit trees. I'm too old to plan a full scale orchard, someone else would very likely enjoy the fruits of my labour - literally! So I reckon the best plan is a fast maturing and portable mini orchard. My aim from all this is to have a number of trees that have different flavours and uses but don't crop so heavily that the apples go to waste. I favour using cordon trees, the following short description, copied from the Chris Bowers and Son website, explains what they are:

A very easy space saving option, cordon fruit trees consist of just one main stem with 2-3" laterals carrying the fruit and flowers. Traditionally grown at a 45 degree angle, they are these days more often grown vertically, but you can still plant them at an angle if you wish. Space cordon apples and pears 2.5-3' apart. They can be grown against a fence or wall, or along posts and wires, or in the open and staked individually with a 'standard rose' type stake, or even a stout bamboo cane. They will reach between 6-8' in height. They do well on all soils except the light and sandy which should have plenty of organic matter incorporated to add body, and the trees mulched thereafter. The beauty of cordons is that they can be planted in pots, tubs or directly into the soil. I think I'll start with some old favourites that I've read about in a book by a long dead author all of which are still available and deemed highly suitable for training as cordons. They are called, in order of ripening; Michaelmas Red that ripens in September (presumably Christmas was early the year this was named), Sunset, a November ripening variety and Adam's Pearmain that ripens between December and January. I may also add a couple of dual purpose trees such as James Grieve for cooking. All these and many more are available from the nursery, Chris Bowers and Sons, which is well worth a look.

Till the Next Time – That's about it for this instalment but I hope I'll see some of you at the allotment on the Open Garden's day and have the opportunity to extol the virtues of allotment gardening to you face to face.
