

The Organic Gardener (Volume 2)

A recent article I read on the internet made me realise that Mrs H (Judy) and me are what the author called 'compulsive gardeners' and I thought I'd begin my piece by sharing some thoughts on this serious condition! Symptoms include:

- Patrolling the garden at night with a torch to remove slugs and snails from vegetables.
- Owning one beaten up old car but being a 'two greenhouse family'.
- Having pockets full of objects that could get you arrested in London.
- Scrounging other people's weeds and grass cutting to make compost.
- Needing more freezers than Tesco.
- Having jars of pickle, chutney, jam and ketchup in every cupboard (yum).
- Growing seeds on the bedroom window sill in winter.
- Boring anyone that wants to listen (and quite a few that don't) about fantastic crops and new horticultural plans and ideas. In fact, pretty much what I'm doing here!

However, despite the drawbacks of taking holidays in winter and spending too much on horticultural accoutrements, the benefits of being addicted to gardening are well worth considering.

Let's start with health. Medical science accepts that both being out in the daylight and getting your hands into the soil is beneficial to your immune system. That's especially good news for young children as it could help protect them from things like asthma in later life and I'm sure its good for adults too.

Then there's the environment, if you have an allotment or garden full of vegetables and fruit, air miles can be reduced to metres walked (or at worst a short car journey) and a corner left for wildlife will encourage all sorts of critters - most of which will be welcome!

Of course it's a sociable pastime as well and the people you meet on an allotment have a common bond, regardless of background, age, colour or race . You can always compare the size of your marrows or share a cup of tea in a shed if you want company and if you fancy being on your own an early start usually gives you a few minutes of seclusion.

I mentioned sheds earlier and of course we all know that they are things of rare beauty. If you have a seat and a gas ring it is grand to make a brew and sit and relax, away from the hustle and bustle of everyday life. Of course no-one can escape completely and there have been murders committed in sheds due to allotment rivalry. But in the main a shed is a place to escape to when you need to chill and if tea isn't your thing try gin!


So, why not come and join us and help secure the future of Gayton's Allotment Society. We will have a few plots available soon due to retirements and folk moving away, so if you've been thinking about having an allotment but not got around to it, now is a good time. You can contact me by email or mobile - details of both are provided at the end of the article.

But enough of the sales patter, it's time to bring you up to speed with our Autumn and Winter plans.

We will of course have the usual suspects outside on our allotment. Brussel sprouts, kale, cabbage, parsnips and carrots will be available well into the winter and this year we have successfully protected the brassicas from the squadrons of cabbage white butterfly's by erecting a net cage over them which has the added benefit of keeping the pigeons out as well.

When the tomatoes are over Judy has decided to try something new and will plant Red Russian Kale and spinach in the greenhouse border. This should enable us to add tender young leaves to winter salads up until Christmas. Lettuce and oriental leaves can also be grown in the greenhouse in winter. This entails lining mushroom crates with cardboard to stop them leaking, adding a layer of manure to the bottom and then filling them up with general purpose compost. The leaves (see below) can then be planted and kept on staging, again providing salads well into the winter.

Gayton Alms Charities

Gayton Alms Charities have been established for over 100 years. Today they are called the 'Gayton Relief in Need Charity' and the 'Gayton Educational Foundation'.

Gayton Relief in Need Charity

This charity exists to provide assistance to any person living in the Parish of Gayton* who for whatever reason find themselves in need, hardship or distress. Usually this assistance is financial, with money paid directly to the successful applicant.

Examples of where this charity might be able to help are with the purchase of food, clothing, heating costs, and grants to assist with funeral expenses.

Gayton Educational Foundation

This charity exists to provide assistance to people living in the Parish of Gayton* who for whatever reason find themselves in need of financial help with their education. Money may be paid directly to the successful applicant but the trustees are able to grant money to organisations in the Parish of Gayton whose purpose is to educate or improve the lives of people through leisure-time activities.

Examples of where this charity might be able to help are in the provision of books, equipment, computer software, IT hardware, musical instruments, travelling expenses, music or dance tuition, residential educational experiences, university fees or anything else not normally provided or funded by an educational institution such as a school, college or university.

The charities receive their modest income from land rents and returns on investments. Trustees meet twice a year to review income and expenditure, and to consider application for assistance under the terms of the scheme for administering the charities.

Any villager who feels they might be eligible for help under the terms of either of the Gayton Alms Charities should contact the Chair of Trustees who will provide the appropriate application form. The Chair of Trustees is happy to offer general advice about an application and/or assist with the completion of an application form.

*In exceptional cases the Trustees may give assistance to people living outside the Parish of Gayton. These people must be able to satisfy the trustees that they ought to be treated as if they lived in the Parish.

Gayton & Tiffield Community Minibus Service

Hi Everyone. Well what a brilliant and sunny summer holiday period we have been enjoying this year. This has been a really challenging but very good year for us so far and we were delighted to be able to provide a Minibus shuttle service for the highly successful Tiffield Open Gardens and our thanks to Geoff Wilkins and David Coppock for providing the shuttle service at Gayton Open Gardens. Having accumulated reserves of over £41,000 thanks to excellent financial management by our Treasurer Cate Gardener and private hire revenue primarily from school runs for Champion and Sponne Schools, we are now able to replace our Minibus which is 10 years old. The replacement minibus we are currently assessing is the latest Ford factory produced 17 seat model which has many desirable features such as parking sensors, rear view camera, inbuilt sat-nav, air-conditioning, luxury seating and an electrically operated sliding door. Hopefully we shall be placing the order very soon and subject to availability should have our new minibus by late October, or November. We are still trying to get an increase in our annual NCC grant but with the extreme financial restrictions on NCC we may have to look at alternative ways of funding our service. This could include extending our services to more local villages and the possibility of 'partnership working' with local villages who have lost their regular bus services. Our annual AGM is provisionally scheduled for October 17th as we need to formally approve our accounts, appoint our Trustees and Officers and determine our strategies for next year. We have also provisionally scheduled our annual MK shopping trip for December 12th. So our thanks to our brilliant team of 11 volunteer drivers, to Cate Gardner for her superb work as our Treasurer and to Cate, Geoff Wilkins, Steve Jowers and Phil Leggett who have all made significant contributions as our Trustees during the past year.



History of Newe House (Part Three: It just gets worse!)

When Mathias Wheelowes died in 1654, his son William, and his wife Dorothy, moved into Newe House. William and Dorothy had twin boys and three daughters, all of whom had died, with the exception of a daughter named Dorothy, after her mother. She was now their only child and heir, and they put all their efforts into making sure that she married extremely well. And she did! And although Mathias Wheelowes did not live to see it, on 17 June 1680 Dorothy Wheelowes his granddaughter, married Arthur Brooke of Great Oakley a descendant of one of the ancient families of Northamptonshire.

Dorothy Brooke's Ancestors



In a bid to marry his daughter well William settled the majority of his lands and dwellings on his daughter, Dorothy, with the exception of Forman's House, which in the light of Mathias second marriage was still in the occupation of Jane Wheelowes.

In 1659 William Wheelowes added a piece of land, 1 acre and 1 rood, from John Houghton the Elder for £20 to his estate. He also purchased the two cottages that Mathias Wheelowes left to his sister Hester, and her son Mathias Barnes, Citizen and Vintner of London.

Having failed to get any more money out of Mathias Wheelowes' Estate, William's sister Ann, took William to Chancery Court over a property deed disputing whether a fine had been levied in 1677 completing the deal.

The result was an Interrogation of various people which shines a light on to William Wheelowes' life as a Gentleman and Grazier and also to some extent of life in Gayton.

Court of Chancery Wheelowes v Mansell

4 Was he the said William Wheelowes then and at all times before so long as you know him of a perfect understanding judgement and memory and not ways suspected to fail in his memory or understanding how long did you know him before such failure And how long after the sealing of the same deed did he continue of sound memory and understanding as you know or remember declare your knowledge in the premises.

Thomas Garratt of Sudborough in the county of Northton (Agricultural) Labourer, 30 years old. (He) saith that he did know Mr Wheelowes for about ten or twelve years before then sealing and delivery of the deeds during all which time he was of a good sound and perfect understanding and so was and continued and at the time of sealing and delivery of the deeds and for about half a year after this date at the time of sealing the deeds and for half a year afterwards living with Mr Wheelowes as his servant and that William Wheelowes during all the time did wholly manage his affairs himself by going to markets and fairs and selling and

buying what he had occasion for in the way of his traffick he having great dealing publicly as a grazier and having a great stock in his hands

Benjamin Winkles of Castle Thorpe in the county of Bucks labourer Aged twenty and five years (He) saith that Mr Wheelowes for the space of two years before them sealing and half a year afterwards did continue of a good sound and perfect understanding and judgement Mr Wheelowes during all the time in the World as a grazier and himself in person re-stocking at fairs and markets buying and selling of cattle there And (he) further saith that for the space of one year (he) lived with the said Mr Wheelowes as his servant in which time the above mentioned deeds were sealed and delivered And (he) lived one other year of the two years and a half with one Mr Lockwood in the town of Gayton where Mr Wheelowes at the same time did live and he had often occasion to meet and discourse with Mr Wheelowes he did always find Mr Wheelowes of a sound and perfect understanding and judgement and did never hear otherwise of him during the time aforesaid

Richard Lockwood of Gayton in the county of Northton gent aged fifty years and upwards William Wheelowes was then of a good sound and perfect understanding and so did continue for about the space of eight or twelve months after And this deponent further saith that he know William Wheelowes for about the space of nine years before their sealing delivery of the deed and during all the time both before and at and after the sealing of the deed Mr Wheelowes did continue and was of a sound and perfect understanding and judgement acting as a Grazier upon his own estate and buying and selling his own goods.

Richard Fitzhugh of Leavencourt in the parish of Paulersperry gent

He did hear it credibly reported and from Dorothy during the life of William Wheelowes and while he was in perfect memory (they) had levied a fine to cut off the entail of their land in Gayton and (he) saith that there was above the space of six months after and upwards before the said Mr Wheelowes lost his memory and understanding

William Watson of Gayton in the county of Northton gent aged forty and five years and this deponent further saith that the said William Wheelowes to this deponent's knowledge did continue of a sound and perfect understanding until about the month of February 1678. And this deponent very well know the said Mr Wheelowes using to accompany him to fairs and markets to buy and sell cattle the said Mr Wheelowes dealing as a Grazier And this deponent never knew or heard although he was intimately acquainted with him that he was ever crazed or unright in his memory perfect or understanding until about the aforesaid month of February 1678.


This Interrogatory gives a unique insight into a group of the well-to-do graziers of Gayton and thereabouts, William Watson from Chain Walk, Richard Lockwood from Outback and William Wheelowes from Newe House going around the local cattle markets together buying and selling their stock. They also employed men to work on the farm, with the good workers being recommended to their friends.

After William's death, Dorothy Wheelowes went to live with Dorothy and Arthur Brooke at Great Oakley.

Jane Wheelowes died in March 1688 and the property that Mathias had given her for life reverted to William's sisters and the Wheelowes/Brookes bought them and put the Wheelowes estate in trust for the benefit of their younger grandchildren, leaving Dorothy Wheelowes

senior, an annuity of £70. Arthur Brooke died in 1699 and Dorothy Wheelowes moved in with her daughter until her death in about 1701.

Andrew Jones was the Tenant Farmer at Newe House




By the time that Dorothy Wheelowes moved out of Newe House the house was about eighty years old and was no longer the up market residence it once had been.

Newe House was now a farmhouse and rented to Andrew Jones, Yeoman. It seems likely that his brothers John and Thomas lived with him and worked on his land.

When Andrew died on 22 May 1705 aged 55 he left a will that implies that he was very much the family patriarch. He leaves John and William 20 shillings every six months for their natural life and his brother Thomas inherits a house in Duston and the rest of Andrew's estate.

After Andrew Jones' death, John Cross took over the tenancy at Newe House Farm in 1705, and he married Sarah Ossin on 16 September 1713 in Ashton.



After her mother and husband died, Dorothy Brooke (nee Wheelowes) started to organise her land ownership, which in her father's time had been chaotic and perhaps she felt she ought to bring some order to her affairs sooner rather than later. In 1707, Dorothy Brooke separated out John Forman's Inheritance and sold it to John Bailey.

Dorothy Brooke's better land on the east side of Gayton became part of her daughter, Dorothy Brooke's marriage settlement when she married Thomas Ekins on 15 Aug 1719 in Oakley. Thomas Ekins of Twywell held the land from 1721 until he died in 1729. In Thomas Ekins' will he bequeathed the land to the eldest son of his niece Sarah Cockman, Thomas Cockman of Wollaston, who at the time was just six years old. When he died it was passed on to his son, also Thomas Cockman, of Bedford who in 1793 sold the land to Thomas Butcher the younger of Northampton, Gent.

Thomas Ekins Will: Made 12 September 1729

Item I give and devise unto Thomas Cockman eldest son of my niece Sarah Cockman all my inclosed grounds and estate in Gayton now in the tenure of John Gibson of Northampton Maltster and Baker



Update regarding the next project

The role of GCHT is to fundraise for the upkeep of Gayton Parish Church, a significant building and plays a part in the life of the village and is hopefully seen as a valuable asset.

All projects and alterations to the Church require an Architect's approval and sanctioned by the Diocese. GCHT and Gayton Parochial Church Council formed a link called a Liaison Group so that we could work together. The next meeting of the group is in October to discuss the outcome of the Architect's opinion on the most cost-effective solutions to improve the heating in the church, the state of the parquet blocks in the North aisle and the need for more storage space.

As the Church is seen as part of the village heritage GCHT was successful in gaining Community Grant-Funding for the servery and a porch for the North Door which enabled the addition of a toilet. In order to qualify for grant-funding additional money needs to be raised by the community from events and from donations. A lot of effort was put into fundraising for the earlier projects which has resulted in a greater use of the building as a good venue for concerts and other such events but not quite welcoming in the winter months.

The heating project, the cost and any other information will appear on the Gayton website.

World Challenge Expedition to Cambodia and Thailand

Some of you may remember me offering my help last year and earlier this year as I tried to raise the funds I needed for a World Challenge expedition. Thanks to your help, on the 16th July 2019 I left for the 3-week expedition to Thailand and Cambodia. The trip introduced me to a whole new culture and people. After 20 hours travelling we arrived in Bangkok and were immediately immersed in a hot, humid, bustling city whilst we finalised transport and accommodation for our travels and the different phases of the trip. During the expedition phase we spent a week in the jungles of Cambodia, trekking and learning how to put up hammocks, and how important the jungle is to the ecosystems in Cambodia. The guides knew a lot about the jungle, and were keen to pass on their knowledge to us – they even helped to make some lovely local dishes from jungle ingredients each evening for dinner!

Another part of the trip was a project phase assisting a local community. We spent one week in a village on an island in the middle of the Mekong River, helping them to build a school for the local children. We also spent time with the community, staying with the families in their homes and getting to know them really well. It was so lovely to be able to communicate with someone, understanding and learning about them. Even with the language barrier they taught me how to lay a concrete floor and make a wedding dessert!

We also explored the history and the culture of the two countries. In Thailand we travelled to Kanchanaburi and trekked to one of Thailand's most famous waterfalls. The waterfall itself has an impressive seven tiers, and the top pool is said to resemble the mystical elephant Erawan. As well as the being able to appreciate the beauty and tranquillity of the country we learnt some of the modern history by trekking through Hellfire Pass. This is the site of the Death Railway built by POWs in World War 2, immortalised in the film 'Bridge on the River Kwai', and it helped us to understand the hardships they suffered.

In Cambodia we visited many sites, including the archaeological sites and temples at Angkor Wat in Cambodia.



As a UNESCO World Heritage site, Angkor is one of the most significant archaeological sites in South-East Asia and is a truly stunning place that could easily occupy me for weeks! In Phnom Penh we visited the Security Office 21 (or S-21, now known as the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum), a former school that became an integral institution of the Khmer Rouge regime from 1975 to 1978, where we glimpsed something of the horror Cambodia has suffered in its recent past, and saw how the impact of that war and the rule of the country under the Khmer Rouge is still so hurtful for the people today.

After an action packed 3 weeks we reluctantly left and returned to the UK. I had a brilliant time and came away with so many new friends, incredible memories of the people we met and the sights we saw, along with a new appreciation for the importance of remembering the history of a place. Thank you so much to everyone in the village who contributed and helped me to take on this challenge, and especially to the Trustees of the Gayton Educational Foundation for their support and donation.

Towcester Watermeadows



The Watermeadows, which were once closed to the public as part of the grade II listed parkland of the Easton Neston Estate, are now accessible to all. In 2009 and 2011 South Northants Council purchased the land that forms the Watermeadows, for public use. Hundreds of people now regularly use the Watermeadows.

In August South Northants Council successfully secured a grant of £164,062 to enhance this wonderful public parkland. This grant will improve the offer and access, and attract a greater cross section of the public to enjoy this open space in the centre of Towcester. The money from the Rural Payments Agency's Growth Programme Scheme under the Rural Development Programme for England will pay for walkways, a picnic area, a natural play trail and signage boards.

Parkrun started the Watermeadows parkrun. It is a 5km run every Saturday at 9am. Its free to everyone, but please register before your first run. Only ever register with parkrun once. Don't forget to bring a printed copy of your barcode. Everyone runs for their own enjoyment, its not a race, run, jog or walk. It is entirely organised by volunteers.
