Gayton and Tiffield Community Minibus

Our extended service to cover Eastcote, Dalscote, Pattishall and Astcote has been running since last June and we are now getting regular passengers from there on the bus which all helps towards our running costs. The small extra journey time does not appear to be important as passengers are already on the bus in the warm and dry but some recent road closures and diversions have been a challenge.

Our current timetable remains the same and is shown on the back cover. Please note that both the Tuesday and Friday services are now the same with the bus leaving Gayton as before at 9:30 but then going through the other villages to Towcester, and then on to Northampton (<u>if</u> requested when getting on. You do not need to book by telephone). The bus will then return to collect from Towcester, drop off passengers in the villages and then collect anyone from Northampton. This allows about an hour each in Towcester and Northampton.

The government have introduced a fare cap for <u>cash</u> customers of <u>£2 per single journey</u>. This is a temporary measure until the end of December 2024. <u>Passengers with bus passes do not have to pay anything</u>.

We are waiting to hear from West Northamptonshire Council about our grant funding for the coming year and are hopeful that they will continue to support us with grant funding at about the same level as last year (or preferably higher), which is a very important source of income for us, as well as our fares (both cash and refunded concessionary ones) and private hire.

Thanks again to our team of nine dedicated drivers which includes John Rogers, Peter Baxter, Manja Ronne and Jens Buus from Gayton and to our Trustees who run things behind the scenes.

Please remember that we are a charity and it is a community bus, so if you want to hire a 16 seater (plus driver) for trips out, airport runs, sports or social events please contact us to see if we are available. Recent trips have been to local pubs and restaurants, airport runs, monthly dining club visits and regular darts team away matches.

Solar Farm Appeal – Gayton – DISMISSED

Simon Hoare MP, Minister of State for Local Government on behalf of the Secretary of State has reported: I am directed by the Secretary of State to say that consideration has been given to the report of Mike Robins MSc BSc(Hons) MRTPI, who held a public local inquiry in person which sat for 4 days into your client's appeal against the decision of West Northamptonshire Council to refuse your client's application for planning permission for the construction of a temporary Solar Farm of up to 49.72MW, to include the installation of solar panels with transformers, a substation, a DNO control room, a customer substation, GRP comms cabin, security fencing, landscaping and other associated infrastructure, in accordance with application Ref. WNS/2021/1858/EIA, dated 22 October 2021. On 12 April 2023, this appeal was recovered for the Secretary of State's determination, in pursuance of section 79 of, and paragraph 3 of Schedule 6 to, the Town and Country Planning Act (TCPA) 1990.

The Inspector recommended that the appeal be allowed and planning permission granted subject to conditions. For the reasons given in his report, the Secretary of State agrees with the Inspector's conclusions, except where stated, but disagrees with the Inspector's recommendation. He has decided to dismiss the appeal and refuse planning permission. Anesco have 6 weeks from the date of refusal to take this to the High Court but they can only

challenge process not opinion.

A huge thank Gayton Parish Council for their incredibly hard work and commitment fighting against the planning application and the appeal, and all the residents and people beyond who sent in objections and attended the appeal.

The Inspector, Mike Robins decision was that the appeal be allowed.

Simon Hoare MP, Minister of State for Local Government on behalf of the Secretary of State disagreed and has dismissed the appeal and refused planning permission.

I am also pleased to report that the valiant efforts of the Gayton Gumball team in raising funds for the additional defibrillators in the village should now finally getting to maturity. One of the units was installed at the Eykyn Arms last year, we have now received the approval of the higher authorities in the Church of England for the second unit to be installed in the church porch. Very many thanks from the PCC and the wider community to all those who went to such lengths to raise the funds.

Photographs of the 2024 crop of snowdrops, emerging primroses, and soon blue bells and a splendid assortment of native wild flowers in the churchyard have been posted on the Gayton Community Facebook page, why not pop along and see them in the flesh! With the help of the volunteers working to clear some of the overgrowth last year, the area is being opened up further and the wild flower displays should be quite impressive. On that note, we have renewed the registration within the Northants Wildlife Trust's Churchyard Conservation Scheme as we continue to promote the such aims here on our doorstep. Of course. we shall strive to maintain those appropriate areas of the churchyard in a way sympathetic those visiting departed relatives and friends.

With botany firmly in mind, a key date for your diaries is Sunday the 9th of June. Once again Gayton shall be hosting the most enjoyable Open Gardens event. Not only is there always a fine array of green-finger talent on show, side events such as produce stalls and afternoon teas make it an afternoon not to be missed. So please put it on the calendar and let family and friends know too. I ought to mention that it is one of our main fundraisers for the year, so please please help us meet our commitments to keep our lovely village church running.

As a reminder, the usual Sunday communion service rota continues with Gayton hosting the 10.00am service on the 4rth Sunday of each month, followed by tea and coffee served with biscuits and friendly chit chat, by all means please join us if you can. We shall let you know if there are any changes to the rota after Marion gets her feet under the table.

Should any of you need to contact the church for any reason, the church wardens (Andy Hartley and John Rogers) and pastoral lay reader (Jean Pugh) would be more than willing to help, full contact details are available on the church noticeboard. Rev. Marion's contact details shall also be circulated when these are confirmed.

Award-Winning Litter Picking - Local boy helps the community, and himself, by regular rounds of litter picking Keen-eyed villagers might have spotted what's becoming a regular sight on Saturdays. Corvus Kilroy each week has been doing the rounds with a trusty litter-picking stick and bin bag in hand, making sure the paths and hedgerows of Gayton are as clean as can be. This hour-long weekly service forms the volunteering part of his progress towards the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award programme, which rewards teenagers for being active and helpful members of society, and it's been something of a surprise.

"The volunteering section was the bit of the award I was least looking forward to," says Corvus, "but I've actually really enjoyed it. It's a good feeling to contribute towards the village, but there are other reasons as well." Chief among



these has been getting to explore the surroundings. "We only moved to the village a few months ago," Corvus continues. "When we moved, I didn't know the area at all, but now I'm getting a real feel for it. Also, it's a really pretty place to walk around and because I'm doing this every week, I've been able to watch the seasons change and spring actually start to bloom." The reason for being able to turn the litter picking into a walk is a simple one. "When I first started, I was walking all around the village centre and not seeing much litter to pick up: Gayton is really tidy and you can tell that people care about where they live. So I've started walking down the lanes leading away from the village, and that's where I've found a load of stuff." Even so, where there have been obvious piles of litter, they've still been cleared away by locals. "When we went on a Sunday walk as a family a couple of weeks ago, there had been some fly-tipped rubbish down Eastcote Road. I made a mental note of it so I could clear it up the following Saturday, but when I got there, it had already gone. That really impressed me."

There was plenty of other litter to pick up, however, mainly thrown from passing cars. "Every week I'm seeing a lot of empty cans of booze – mainly Fosters – as well as two bottles of Jack Daniels and some wine bottles. The fact that there seems to be so much literal drink-driving probably explains the number of abandoned car parts as well: I've picked up hubcaps, radiator grills, and part of a bumper." There have been other surprising finds as well. "Given the fact that Waitrose is meant to be really up-market, I've picked up a lot of empty meal deal wrappers from there. I've also found a perfectly intact tea mug and a drinks glass, and a male fragrance bottle. I wasn't brave enough to smell what was inside though!" When asked if he's likely to continue after he's finished the required time, he replied, "Probably not every week! Generally I'm looking forward to having a bit more free time, but I have started noticing litter more now – like when we're in the car or on a walk. I'm not sure I'll be able to stop myself from clearing it up any longer. Also, it turns a bimble into a walk with purpose, which is fine by me!"

Gayton Open Gardens will held this year on Sunday 9th June 1-5pm. The purpose of the event is to raise money for Gayton Church, helping towards the running costs, utility bills and fabric repairs of the building.

As in previous years a number of villagers will open their gardens, there will be a teddy bear trail for younger visitors and refreshments will be served in the church. Additionally this year there will be a plant stall.

We have welcomed visitors from surrounding villages, towns and even further afield. Many of our gardeners have opened their gardens on more than one occasion and some have opened every year since 2015!
